



<p>What phase is Park County currently in?</p>	<p>As of April 1, 2021, Park County is in the public phase of COVID-19 vaccine distribution</p>
<p>Who is eligible to receive the vaccine under Phase 1B?</p>	<p>Vaccines in this phase are available for all Park County residents over the age of 16.</p>
<p>How do I get the vaccine?</p>	<p>Eligible residents in Park County can schedule vaccine appointments online at https://park-county-coronavirus-response-parkcounty.hub.arcgis.com/</p>
<p>What if I don't have access to the internet?</p>	<p>That's okay! We are happy to assist you. Please call our HRDC office in Livingston at 406.333.2537 and we will assist you. If you don't have a phone, you can stop by our Livingston office and request an appointment at 111 South 2nd St, Livingston, MT 59047 from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm, Tuesday through Friday. Masks are required.</p>
<p>Is the vaccine safe?</p>	<p>The Moderna, Pfizer, and Johnson & Johnson vaccines have been approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). All are effective and considered safe for most people. If you have specific concerns, please call your primary healthcare provider. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), "The U.S. vaccine safety system ensures that all vaccines are as safe as possible. Safety is a top priority while federal partners work to make this and other COVID-19 vaccines available."</p>
<p>What about the pause of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine?</p>	<p>The CDC has lifted the temporary pause of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine and is again recommending it as a safe option. In practicing an abundance of caution, the CDC paused the Johnson & Johnson vaccine to look into a very small number of cases of blood clots. A review of all of the data found that the benefits of receiving the vaccine outweigh the potential risks. Can a COVID-19 vaccine make me sick with COVID?

None of the available vaccines contain the live virus that causes COVID-19. So, a COVID-19 vaccine cannot make you sick with COVID-19. The COVID-19 vaccines do teach our immune systems how to recognize and fight the virus. Sometimes this can cause short-term symptoms similar to the virus, like a fever or fatigue. But, this is normal for some people.

It's important to remember that after you've received your vaccine, it will take a few weeks for your body to build up its protection against the virus. It is possible to become infected with COVID-19 if you are exposed before you receive your vaccination or shortly after. This is because the vaccine has not had enough time to build up protection. This is also why it's still important to follow all CDC guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19, even if you're vaccinated. That includes staying six feet away from others, wearing a mask, avoiding crowds and indoor areas, limiting nonessential travel, and washing your hands!

How much does the vaccine cost? What if I don't have health insurance?

For most people, the vaccine will be free. If you are receiving a vaccine through your local health department it has been purchased and paid for with U.S. taxpayer dollars and will be free.

If you are receiving the vaccine through a private vaccine provider, there may be an administrative fee. Many health insurance companies are covering the cost of the vaccine. Contact your health insurance company for details.

For uninsured patients, the CDC states that "no one can be denied a vaccine if they are unable to pay the vaccine administration fee."

I'm still a little worried about getting the vaccine. Where can I find more information?

The CDC and the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS) are valuable places to get more information.
